Robert C. Collins

Remembered by W. Lock Collins Submitted by Robert's daughter, Mary Ellen C. Becker



Bob was born in Iowa Falls, Iowa on October 16, 1923 to Zada and Edward Collins. He graduated from high school in Knoxville, Iowa in June of 1942. In high school, Bob was a varsity athlete in a number of sports as well as a lifeguard at the local swimming pool. As a member of "The Greatest Generation" Bob quickly joined the Naval Medical Corp which provided medical support to the US Marine Corp.

In early 1945, he boarded a troop ship bound for Iwo Jima and stepped foot on Iwo Jima after the initial invasion started. His job was to help set up a battlefield hospital as well as to accompany troops into battle as a medic as the Marines tried to gain control of the island. He was there to witness the

well-known raising of the American Flag. Bob spent much of his time sleeping in foxholes and providing battlefield medical attention to wounded soldiers. Once Iwo Jima was secured, and the atomic bombs dropped in Japan, Bob was transferred to Japan as a member of the Allied invasionary force.

Bob attended Macalester College for two years and then transferred to the University of Minnesota where he earned his BS degree in Geology in December 1949. Bob went on to a successful career with the Industrial Mineral Products Division of Minnesota Mining.

Bob and his wife Sue lived most of their lives together in Stillwater, MN. In 1956, they bought a home on the North Hill and there they raised four children. Bob was an active member of the community supporting various organizations and the arts in Stillwater and the Twin Cities area. He traveled extensively for 3M, but also spent many weekends and vacations camping with his family throughout the US.

In Rutherford Cemetery, the niche of Jonathan David Francis faces west, a place of tall mountains, that he loved, and where he died.

March 5, 1982. Jonathan David Francis. We had his name picked out for twenty-two years. His mother, Linda, and I were high school sweethearts. We often talked about a time when we would be married, have children together, and raise a family. We agreed to name our firstborn son Jonathan David. Jonathan is Hebrew for "God's gift" and David means "beloved."



Jon was born in Northfield but raised in Stillwater. In high school he was a three-sport athlete and the youngest member of the 1997

He majored in Religion in college then moved out west to serve as a Director of Youth Ministry in Utah and a Christian Camp Counselor in Idaho where he continued his love affair with nature- **God's beautiful creation.** Jon was on his way to seminary back here in Minnesota in the Fall of 2006. Sadly, he did not complete his journey.

On July 15, 2006, at just 24 years old, Jon died in a mountain climbing accident while descending from the summit of the Grand Mogul, in the Sawtooth Mountains in Idaho. Jon got it! He loved life. And he loved people.

He lived joyfully and loved boldly. Jon knew that we were not placed on earth to grab all of the objects, money, and status we can. We are born into this world to make a difference, to love God, and to love and serve others. Jon *got* it! That is how Jon Francis lived his brief life.

I first met Ron Guse in the fall of "84" in Laguna Beach. A quick passing with friends (30 seconds). He was 28 and I was 30. Three weeks later I ran into him in Studio City (gay disco). I remembered him. He was talking to friends I knew. Something just seemed right. After talking to him for about 10 minutes I took him home with me. I was looking for a roommate at the time also. The more I talked to him, I wanted him to move in as a roommate. He wasn't sure, seemed to have his own plan. After about 5 days of him staying with me, I suggested we make what would be his room a TV room and he share my bedroom (live together), he said YES. Three weeks later he was moved in. For the next three months we shopped a lot (furniture, dishes, etc.). He turned my house into our home. We even rebuilt the engine in his car.

Then we started having friends over for dinners, holidays, and pool parties. Ron cooked and I cleaned. At one of our dinner parties a friend who got frustrated when she called out the name Ron and we both answered, finally said, looking at me your "R1" and then at Ron Guse, you're "R2". From that point everyone knew him as "R2".

We were together seven and a half years. The day he passed away our home turned into a house.

Scott Paul Zurn was born to Robert and Arlene Zurn (Paul) on June 21, 1971. He was the baby brother of FIVE sisters and two brothers: Cheryl, Darryl, Nancy, Mary, Rob, Linda and Julie. "Scotty" was loved and grew up in a family that enjoyed the simple things in life. They took advantage of the "farmer's land" in the neighborhood by playing capture the flag, statue-statue, skating, climbing trees, and making obstacle courses. Their family attended St. Mary's of the Lake Catholic church and all the kids were part of catechism on Wednesdays and services on Sundays followed by family nights watching Lawrence Welk. The tradition continued as all of Scott and Lynn's children were baptized and continued their religious instruction at St. Mary's.

Scott grew up in Vadnais Heights attending Birch Lake Elementary, Central Junior High, and White Bear Lake Area High School. He enjoyed participating in Boy Scouts, youth sports and hanging out with friends.

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Scott was a born leader and had a fierce competitive spirit that served him well as he played basketball and football in high school. He was nominated as team captain his senior year for both sports. Scott attended Gustavus Adolphus College and majored in Geology. As a Gusty, he played football and was a natural athlete and a great team player. He also liked to sketch and did some notable paintings that were proudly displayed at his house. As part of his geological explorations, Scott was able to travel to the island of St. John, Virgin Islands, Bend, Texas, and New Mexico. His experiences and geology degree allowed him to work as an Environmental Geologist at Braun Intertec, Bay West, and Canadian Pacific Railroad.

Scott and Lynn LaValley met in 1994 when Rob's wife, Sharon, set them up on a blind date. It was love at first sight and they were married at St. Mary's in 1995. They lived in a cute apartment in St. Paul and worked to buy their first home and start a family in Como Park. Aidan was born in 1997 and "Chloe Bird" was born in 2000. As the family grew, they moved to a beautiful older house in St. Paul and welcomed Gavin in 2003. The family moved to Stillwater in 2004 and Grayson was welcomed to the family in 2005. The Zurn Family made a fun-loving home and surrounded themselves with many friends. The family stayed active in t-ball, baseball, basketball, soccer, football, lacrosse, and volleyball. The Zurn Cabin was a source of great pride and fun. It housed many memories with both sides of the family. The LaValley crew invaded and added to the family adventures. Scott looked forward to his annual winter weekend with the "Great 8." As a family, they traveled to Destin, Florida every year and enjoyed vacations in Montana and Colorado and many other states during several seasons of traveling baseball. As a couple, Scott and Lynn were able to get away on a few vacations to Cancun and Cabo San Lucas. Scott spent his time coaching, running, training for marathons, doing CrossFit, and playing basketball. He liked cooking dinner when he had the time and loved just hanging out with his family.

Scott was passionate about being part of the youth sports community which allowed him to coach his own kids and help develop a program that was challenging and dynamic for all his players. Scott's coaching history is extensive, and the players loved "Coach Zurn." To show his love of the game, he volunteered as a coach nearly every season his kids played and as the Football Commissioner for the VAA 2017-2019.

Scott was diagnosed with Stage IV Renal Cell Carcinoma in February 2020. He underwent treatments and endured side effects that challenged him physically and mentally. Scott's courage, determination and fighting spirit were fueled by the need to be there for his kids. He was proud to be a coach but being a dad is what made his heart full. Scott wanted to be remembered as a devoted father as well as a positive and productive member of the Stillwater community. He made his kids and coaching a priority and was dedicated to teaching the youth confidence, passion, and teamwork on and off the field. He spent his last days surrounded by those he loved and cherished and passed away with Lynn and their kids by his side. You will be dearly missed by all. Rest easy Scott.

Rutherford Honors Society: Darrell Benson

Given Darrell Benson's roots in the Rutherford neighborhood and his leadership skills practiced as a student at Forest Lake High School and member of Future Farmers of America (FFA), logic and fate may have combined to bring him to help shape Rutherford Cemetery through the years.

Darrell is a descendant of Stephen Webster Powell on his grandmother's side, Marilla Powell Benson. Having come from this lineage, it makes sense that he knows from much lived experience what it means to have history in and direct ties to Rutherford Cemetery and the Association.



As a child in the early 1950s, Darrell lived for a handful of years in 'the old Powell house' with his grandparents Rilla and Martin Benson. It still sits only a half-mile north of Rutherford Cemetery, just west of Manning.

So, Darrell grew up in the Rutherford neighborhood and his family actively participated in Rutherford's growth and care. His grandmother Rilla was an active member of the Priscilla Club and later the Rutherford Cemetery Association serving as temporary chairperson, president, and then trustee. Among other family members who contributed as Rutherford officers and trustees were his dad Karl and uncle Ronald.

Darrell's memories of his activity at Rutherford begin many years before he was a member of the board himself, when at various and many times he was also trustee, vice president, and president of the Association.

He recalled the neighborhood men taking turns

digging the graves, "probably in the 1950s . . . I was mostly watching." During one dig, he said, they found a skull in the soil. They speculated that when people traveling through the area experienced a loss, they would stop, dig, and bury the person before going on their way.

He vaguely remembers the ice cream socials held when he was a kid, but he does

remember "the worst job" – painting the old fence. He said Ron Johnson would supply the aluminum paint and every four years they would paint the fence not with a brush but with a pad – "and if you stood down wind, you looked like the Tin Man."

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After Darrell was out of the Air Force in 1969, he remembers going with his dad to all the annual meetings. He recounts that, at the time, these meetings were held in private homes, noting they had to be prudent in their planning and hold them in homes with gravel or paved driveways, else they would risk getting their cars stuck in the mud.

He brought handyman skills as a volunteer at Rutherford. He helped Ron Johnson in his task of locating lots in the winter by welding metal lot marker plates for easy discovery under the snow. He also created and installed the side railings for the concrete steps on the north side near the flagpole.

As a board member, he said one of the biggest ongoing concerns of the board was whether there would be adequate funds in the perpetual fund. They were thankful for the good interest rates of the 1970s; and they later learned they were able to use some of the money for improvements to Rutherford, which could include land purchase. So, in the early 1990s, he and his dad talked with Art Welander and got a commitment for the property, allowing the expansion of the Rutherford property to the east for future development.

As I learned of Darrell's stories of his involvement in Rutherford's growth and improvement as an adult, my sense is he is a down-to-earth and dependable person who appreciates commitment to a job done well and leaving a solid legacy.

Rutherford Cemetery proper and the Association have benefitted from Darrell's years of involvement and enduring loyalty. He no longer lives in the Rutherford neighborhood full time, so it's a pleasure to have him around for spring cleanup days and Memorial Day services when timing brings him back to the area. When you see him, please be sure to say, Darrell, *thank you* for your commitments and contributions to Rutherford's sustainability and growth.

Darrell's great-grandparents Stephen W. and Amanda Powell, grandparents Rilla and Martin Benson, uncle Ronald Benson, parents Karl and Lois Benson, and other family and ancestors are buried at Rutherford. For these histories and other information, visit RutherfordCemetery.org.
